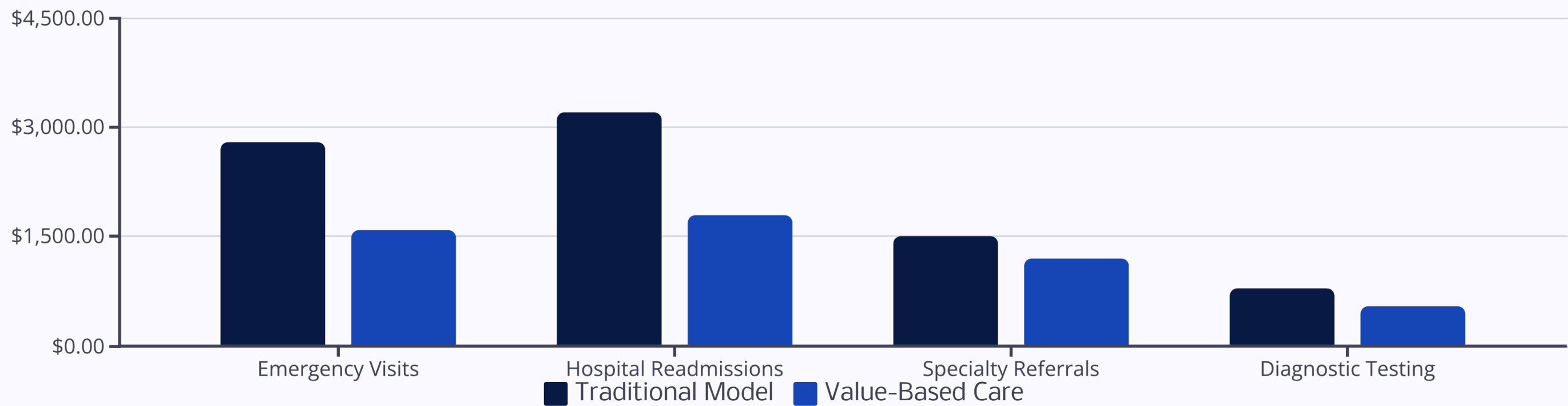

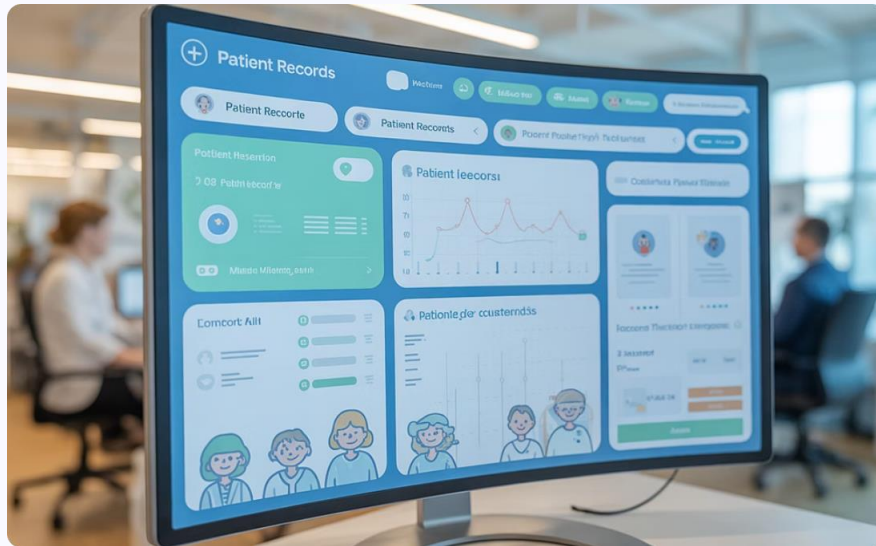

Taking on financial responsibility for patient outcomes requires sophisticated risk assessment capabilities and the ability to manage population health across diverse patient populations.

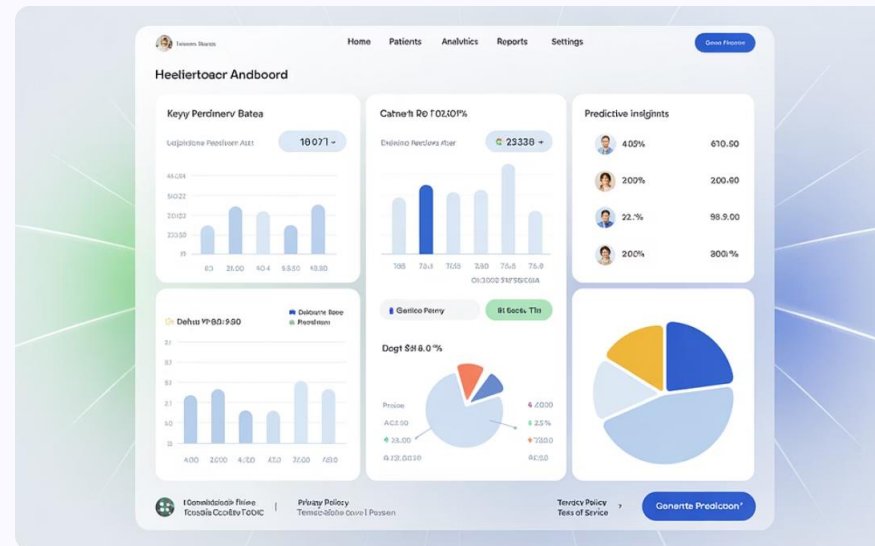

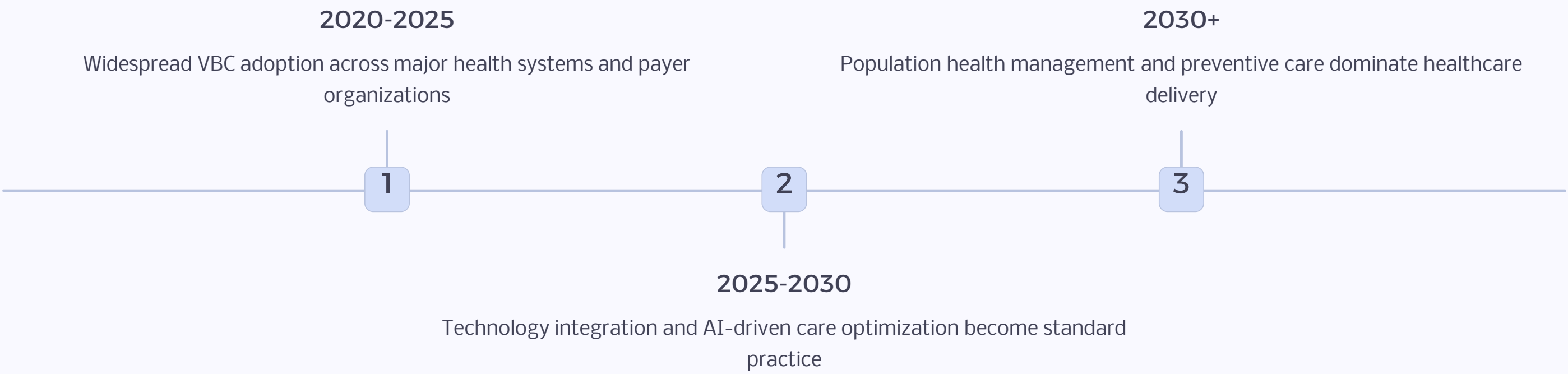
